# Salem witch trials

## FACTS

-The Salem witch trials of the late 17th century was a kaotic time in America's early history, and have remained at the forefront of the national consciousness ever since.

-25 people lost their lives because of the trials. 20 were executed (generally hanged) by the prosecutors, and five died while serving prison time. Two of the casualties were babies.

### WHEN DID IT TAKE PLACE

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- They began in 1692, a full 73 years before the start of the American Revolution and some 40 years before George Washington was even born.

#### How to prove you were a witch

-One thing they would do was the "swimming test." they would drag you to the nearest body of water, strip you to your undergarments, bound and then toss you into the water and see if you sing or float.

-An innocent person would sink like a stone, but a witch would simply bob on the surface. The victim typically had a rope tied around their waist so they could be pulled from the water if they sank, but it wasn't unusual for accidental drowning deaths to occur.

- The touch test worked on the idea that victims of sorcery would have a special reaction to physical contact with their evildoer.

- Where a possessed person fell into spells or fits, the suspected witch would be brought into the room and asked to a lay a hand on them. A non-reaction signaled innocence, but if the victim came out of their fit, it was seen as proof that the suspect had placed them under a spell.

#### WHERE THEY TOOK PLACE

#### Salem is located in Massachusetts

-Some of the trials actually took place in Ipswich and Andover in addition to Salem itself.

-Despite being generally known as the Salem witch trials, the preliminary hearings in 1692 were conducted in several towns: Danvers, Salem Town, Ipswich, and Andover.
